(Family members are always welcome to attend Sunday School if you wish!) After worship is over, families can go across the drive to sign out their children with the teachers. Sunday School is free of charge.

Green News/Tips: As reported in the Maine Beach Mapping Program Data for 2022, the volume of beach sand has remained relatively constant on Ogunquit Beach over the decades. More recently, however, increasingly larger storms have severely reduced the state of the beach and the dunes. With the projected increase in sea level rise, higher tides and the effects of climate changes, this consistent cycle will be altered. With the thought of hauling new sand onto the beach (first project on Coney Island in 1923), nature-based solutions to vulnerabilities may be next. The reuse of Christmas trees (most often ending up in landfills) becomes an option. Set the trees down along the front of the dunes, end to end, tied together and staked down. This creates a sand trap to help rebuild frontal dunes. Willard Beach in South Portland and Goose Rocks in Kennebunkport are utilizing grants to apply this method to assist in resilience to climate change.
